• The Cattle Industry on the Great Plains

1. Activity 1 – parts 1 and 2 are suitable for 4th graders
Through map work students will answer questions about the settlement of the west and why the Great Plains was one of the last areas settled.

2. Activity 4 – Team Projects

Students will view the building of the railway from three different perspectives. Look at the instructions for groups 1, 2 and 4 only. Use any of the language arts prompts of a brochure, diary, or letter to Congress to have your student groups of American Indians, Miners, Settlers, Railway Owners, or Cattle Ranchers express their view about land use in Colorado during the period from 1860-1900.

- 1. Go to Teacher's Guide Front Matter
- 2. Provide students with a printed copy from the section titled a Mining in Colorado Teacher's Overview"
- 3. Using this material, the students will create a diary of life at a mining camp and the importance of the railway to the miners. The students should include descriptions of community life, town life, mining tools etc.
